I am writing above a letter from five years ago, simply because it has the same date as today, the 17th. May be interesting to read about some events way back. I noticed in it a reference to an ABs game. I had forgotten about Rugby for a while, so looked it up just now and found

that there was a test yesterday between NZ and Ireland in Christchurch. Ireland nearly won but a drop goal by Dan Carter in the last minute gave NZ a 22-19 win. As the game was in Christchurch, I guess they have patched up the ground following the earthquake. And talking about the Chch earthquake, they are going to replace the cathedral in the square



out of cardboard!! Should be earthquake proof! It is being designed by a Japanese architect (who is doing it free of charge) who has designed other buildings out of cardboard (including a cathedral in Kobe, Japan following the 1995 earthquake there). It is supposed to be temporary but sometimes temporary constructions can become permanent particularly if people start to like them. The classic example is the Eiffel Tower which was supposed to have been dismantled following the world exposition is Paris.







As I mentioned last week, most of that day was spent finishing the revision of the Singapore lower secondary science books. That is not the end of the work though; there is still at least one more round. After evening dinner that day, I sat on the balcony for some time while I had a yoghurt. This is the first time I have sat there. There has been some hot weather this past week. On one day, the maximum around these parts was 34°C and even the minimum was above 29°C!! Because of the hight temperatures, the water temperature in the pool reached 30°C. But still all right; I imagine the water in the hotel pool is about 33°C by now. Did 10 km for the five-day week, but only 1.3 km on Wednesday as the pool closed because of a thunderstorm.

The other day, the CE-elect observed a one-minute silence at some public gathering for the 'suicide' of a dissident in China (probably against his will as he said he would not comment on the incident). Have you hear about this incident? The guy was a 1989 protester and dissident who had been released from prison only about a year ago. Well, he was found hanged in a hospital recently. The authorities said it was suicide! But nobody in HK believes that! To start with, he was blind. To imagine a blind person getting out of bed and being able to find some way to hang himself, and given that he was probably being watched 24/7, just stretches all credulity. There have been quite a lot of protests in HK over it, and even people in the current, outgoing administration have spoken out about it. Also, several local representatives to some of China's senior councils have called for an investigation. However, the central government may not be able to do much. The problem is with officials in provincial and municipal governments, who often do what they like with impunity. I was reading in last week;s *Time*, that central government officials often do not know what is happening ion the provinces and have to find out by going online and listening to gossip, just like everybody else!!

With a little help, I have probably worked out what was going on at Tom's graduation. I mentioned last week that there were no photos from his graduation two years ago. That seems to be because it must have been for his Ph.D. but had to wait until completing his MD before officially graduating, which seems to be the HMS practice. Also, from the pictures of Leonie in an academic gown, I thought she was just wearing her MD gown for the sake of the occasion. I had no idea that she too was graduating, with a Master's in Public Health.

forced to up to 19 hours a day in appalling conditions. Many were killed, some even buried alive! Raids involving tens of thousands of police have rescued about 500 of the slaves. The picture on the top left shows a 'dormitory' for some of the slaves.

There seem to be so many anniversaries of wars! The latest is for the Falklands war, which was 25 years ago.

On TV, I saw a very brief but interesting item on a Royal Navy helicopter display team. They were
